Current Position: Board of Director, Engagement Australia and Director, Precincts Strategy and Development, Victoria University

Kerry O'Neill (Chair) is the Board of Director for Engagement Australia and the Director, Precincts Strategy and Development at Victoria University. As Associate Director, Engagement Initiatives and manager of the Footscray University Town initiative, Kerry was responsible for fostering collaborations and partnerships with local government, industry and community organisations, extending Victoria University's outward focus and

engagement in Melbourne's west. Kerry has extensive cross sector experience related to community and stakeholder engagement, and strategic planning, in state and local government, university and community contexts.

Kerry holds a Master of Urban Policy and Planning from RMIT, a Bachelor of Education from La Trobe University and a Bachelor of Arts (Politics and History) from the University of Melbourne.



Professor Ekant Veer

Current Position: Professor of Marketing and the Director of the Christchurch Knowledge Commons, University of Canterbury, NZ

Ekant Veer is a Professor of Marketing and the Director of the Christchurch Knowledge Commons at the University of Canterbury, Christchurch. He is a multi-award winning teacher and researcher having been named in the Top 40 under 40 Business School Professors worldwide; an Ako Aotearoa Tertiary Teaching Excellence Award winner; UC's Teaching Medal awardee in 2017 and

five times winner of a UCSA Lecturer of the Year award. His work looks at the role that marketing can play in both driving social change and community wellbeing as well as what impact digital technology plays in consumer interactions and their sense of identity. His research has been published in numerous international journals, such as the Journal of Marketing Management, The European Journal of Marketing, and The Journal of Public Policy and Marketing. Ekant has recently taken on the role as Director of the Christchurch Knowledge Commons which looks to support the University of Canterbury's commitment to kotahitanga [partnerships] and engagement between tertiary sector and businesses, community, and the public sector.

Professor Marie Wilson is Chief Academic Services Officer for the University of South Australia. Professor Wilson is a member of the Executive Leadership Team of the University, with responsibility for student services, student administration, student equity and engagement, and UniSA International. Professor Wilson has a track record of delivering in both industry and university leadership. In her former role as leader of the UniSA Business School, the University received national and international awards for innovation and student services and was repeatedly commended for its enterprising service culture.

As Pro Vice-Chancellor (Indigenous Strategy) she is responsible for providing

leadership in developing the strategic direction of the university regarding Indigenous matters, including institutional policy, strategy and advice in relation to all aspects of Indigenous higher education at QUT. The position plays a critical role in engaging within the university, external stakeholders and Indigenous communities, to establish effective and productive relationships. Ms Barney-Leitch ensures alignment of all related Indigenous initiatives and activities with the university's overall strategic direction.

She has significant experience in Indigenous Australian education and strategic policy. Current Position: Professor Emeritus, University of Canterbury, NZ

Eric Pawson is Emeritus Professor of Geography, University of Canterbury, New Zealand. He is a past president of the Ako Aotearoa Academy of national tertiary teaching award winners, and a recent executive member of the Australasian Council of Undergraduate Research. He developed pedagogical interests in problem-based and community-based research in post-earthquake Christchurch, and is now working with a range of agencies to develop an ambitious living laboratory in the city's red zone, probably the

largest area of managed retreat in an urban area internationally. Publications include *Seeds of Empire*. *The Environmental Transformation of New Zealand* (Bloomsbury 2020, with Tom Brooking), and 'Into the Anthropocene: environmental history and the morality of climate change', in the *International Review of Environmental History*, as well as two essays in the forthcoming *Cambridge Handbook of Undergraduate Research*.

Professor William Lock is Director of the Centre for the Study of Higher Education, University of Melbourne (Melbourne CSHE). His research interests include the governance and management of HEIs; the changing academic profession; the teaching-research nexus; HE policy and policy-making; the impact of marketisation (including league tables and other forms of ranking) on HEIs and systems; and international higher education. He is Co-Editor of *Changing Higher Education for a Changing World* (Bloomsbury, 2020) with Claire Callender and Simon Marginson, and is currently working on the manuscript for *Challenging Approaches to Academic Career Making* with Co-Authors Celia Whitchurch and Giulio Marini (Bloomsbury forthcoming 2022). He has a wide range of other publications and has given keynote presentations at international conferences in North America, Australia, China, Japan and throughout Europe.

Current Position: Director, Research Partnerships & Initiatives, RMIT


